#### **TROUT NURSERY NEWS**

Ahh, the spring newsletter, how sweet it is. My grass is covered with snow and my heavy coat is ready in case I leave the warm house. Spring is just around the corner and opener on April 18th.

Our annual supply of fingerlings arrived, which included 50 goldens, 50 rain-

bows and 3560 brownies. Prior to their arrival we did our annual cleaning of the raceways, which includes high pressure washing, removing all the tops so the sun will help kill some bacteria and sanitize the concrete. Our fish feeders always step up with the help needed to complete our annual cleaning. With our stocking schedule this year, we will have the raceways empty for a longer period of time, so we can cover the concrete with polymer paint. This will speed the cleaning process and protect the fish from scraping their flesh and opening sores. When they open their flesh, bacteria can enter and kill the fish.

On Saturday, January 31st, three members from the club, Mark Gersavage, Bob Manotti Jr., and I attended a seminar at State College for the Co-op Nursery that supplies our fish. We all learned more about the fish rearing process and polymer coating was one

We took several items to share with the other nursery managers as door prizes, such as mugs and caps. A dinner was served at 5 PM for 80 attendees. We received our 10 year certificate for raising fish from the Co-op nurseries.

Big thanks to all the volunteers involved in the fish program we well as the Club. We received another grant this year from the

Co-op which will allow us to get a new air blower, water pump and some miscellaneous equipment. This spring we will be extending the pipe above the road another 20 feet with a new water jack dam and filter area. This will raise the water head to the raceway.

#### **GAME COMMISSION REPORT**

The hunting season has pretty much come to a close. Hopefully every one has enjoyed their days afield this past year and have plenty of stories land memories that can be passed down to future generations of hunters and be told over and over again at camp.

Planning has now started for gearing up for next year and that starts with the Hunter Education classes. This year we will be offering these different course dates at the Buffalo Valley Sportsmen's Club — March 14, May 16, August 15 and September 26. What you may have noticed looking at the dates is that the H.T.E. courses are one day courses. The Hunter Education Division has changed the course to a six hour format and along with the final test the course can be done in eight hours. Prior to taking the course a student must go to the PGC website under Hunter Education and study three chapters on their own prior to the day of the course. If anyone does not have computer access they can call the following numbers and get a book for the pre-study requirements. Parents who bring their kids to the H.T.E. course should consider taking the course also. If you ever had thoughts of going out west on a hunt you need to show your H.T.E. card to acquire a license since showing your PA license will not meet the requirements. For pre-registration call either Allan Zimmerman at 966-0173 or 966-0270.

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Two different Bowhunter Education classes will be offered at Buffalo Valley Sportsmen's club from 0800-1600 hrs on March 21 and August 22. Individuals wishing to take the B.H.E. classes must sign up via the PGC website or call BVSA at 966-0270.

For the 2014 bear season a total of 3,366 bears were harvested statewide with 42 harvested in Union Co. The highlight in Union County was a 639 lb. bear taken in West Buffalo Twp.. There are quite a few bear in the county over 500 lbs. and this harvest proves how large they can get.

Deer season was highlighted this year by a majority of hunters saying about seeing more deer prior to the season than in past years. The archery kill was slightly up this year and there were expectations for a good rifle kill which didn't materialize. Bad weather during the two week rifle season seemed to be the downfall with only the last Saturday of the season bringing decent weather and a fair harvest. There were some very large racked buck taken throughout the season and after the standard drying period should place in the record books after scoring.

Hunters can start looking forward to the Spring Gobbler season and should have no trouble at that time locating birds. Reports have been steadily coming in all over the county about very large flocks of turkeys with some numbering up to 120 birds in a flock.

Remember that as we come to a close on one hunting season and get ready to begin another is that you the hunter can help make a difference in conservation. Planting food plots for wildlife, putting up bird boxes, getting involved in teaching hunter education, or having the intestinal fortitude to step forward and turn in a poacher are all things that enhance our image as conservationalists. Don't be afraid to step up to the plate and make it happen.

#### **FISH & BOAT COMMISSION REPORT**

As most know, fishing license sales are the main source of income for the fish fund for the PFBC (boating funds by law must be kept separate and may not be used for the fish fund), and every six years or so, the cost of a fishing license is raised to compensate for rising costs (most significantly the trout rearing program). The current license fee

has not been raised since 2005. This may sound like a lead-up to a license increase, but for the first time in the history of the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission the cost of a license has been reduced! It actually has ben reduced 1% - which amounts to a dollar. Past increases, while resulting in the expected revenue increase, also resulted in the reduction of license sales. The hope is that the decrease will lure anglers back who have stopped purchasing as well as those who have chosen not to purchase a license. The new price went into effect December 1, 2014. Other license related fees are not affected (trout stamp, button, etc.).

In other news, the invasive rusty crayfish has up to now been regulated since 2005 through a no possession/sale/transportation/culture ban. It is now known that there are five other invasive crayfishes here that are unregulated. Crayfish are an important part of the food chain and native crayfish are being replaced by the invasive crayfishes, which can cause a disruption to the natural aquatic environment. Stopping these invasive crayfish of course

becomes unmanageable once they become widespread. I have had reports of huge numbers of rusty crayfish congregating in the Susquehanna River. Since most people have trouble identifying the various types of crayfish, new rules have been proposed. Licensed anglers would be permitted to harvest a maximum of 50 crayfish (the current regulation), but if transporting the crayfish, must remove the head from behind the eyes. If using the crayfish as bait in the water from which it was taken, this is not required. Other rules are proposed regarding the sale and importation of crayfish. The replacement of native crayfish is occurring across the country, with half of the native populations imperiled and these rules have been passed in other states with broad public support.

Finally, beginning January 1, 2015, senior resident lifetime license holders will be required to purchase a trout stamp annually. Holders prior to this date will not be required to purchase a trout stamp. Lake Erie permits will be exempt from annual purchase, but for a combination permit, the trout stamp will need to be purchased yearly. Without raising additional money for the stocked trout program, which accounts for about a third of the fish fund expenses, the PFBC would no longer be able to afford to produce the same number of trout each year.

With my promotion, this left a vacant Fisheries Technician position within the Unit. This was difficult for the two of us to handle, along with conducting our routine fall inspections and performing our daily tasks in the office. We were able to get through it and are thankful for the understanding of our nursery sponsors as, at times, we had to prioritize the calls for "sick fish."

With my promotion to Unit Leader, I have goals and plans that I feel will improve the program. Some of them include updating the nursery manager manual, simplifying the grant program, ex-
